# 2022 Financial Overview

- 2022 Budget of \$15000 was accepted in November of 2021
  - \$6,000 General Landscaping of Tennis Island, Cherry Tree Island and Hamilton Front Entrance April -November 2022; Mulching of garden beds
  - \$4000 Pruning
  - \$500 Spring Fling
  - \$500 Harvest Party
  - \$1000 Website and Quickbooks
  - \$1500
     Postage/Mailings/Administrative
     Costs
  - \$2500 Overage/Miscellaneous Items

Rochelle Heights 5 Islands are maintained by neighborhood individuals who spend approximately \$500-\$1500 per year of their own money to maintain the various islands at Orchard and Hamilton, Brookdale and Hamilton, Slocum and Hamilton, Hunter and Blvd East, and Hunter and Cortlandt. This is NOT included in the current budget.

#### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR US?

- 96 Members is the <u>HIGHEST</u> number of members we have seen contributing dues to the Rochelle Heights Association that anyone can remember.
- That's WONDERFUL NEWS. Let's keep that MOMENTUM!
- HOWEVER, If we only had Membership Dues with which to operate, we would still be operating at a \$5400 deficit.

### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR US?

- Some of our neighbors are picking up an unfair burden making additional donations and maintaining community properties that help ALL of our property values.
- We're okay financially for 2022 but not financially stable or sustainable.
- Our current financial "plan" hasn't really been a plan at all.
- WE NEED MORE REVENUE JUST TO SUSTAIN!

### 2023 Financial Outlook and Proposal

RHA Dues in 1908 were \$50.

RHA Dues in 2022 are \$100.

Current Paid Members as of May 23, 2022 is 46.

- \$4600 revenue ACTUALLY available to create 2023 Working Budget
- This does not even cover our basic landscaping maintenance.

### 2023 Financial Outlook and Proposal

- Proposal for Membership Dues Increase to \$250 Annually as of 2023 Fiscal Year (ACCEPTED May 2022 Annual Meeting)
- Requires 60 Memberships to maintain current budget of \$15000
- Dues are accepted all year but are most helpful when received by April 30, before May Annual Meeting to create an accurate financial snapshot and budget when the next year's budget is proposed.

Comparable Neighborhood Association Dues: Bayberry \$350 w/o pool access. Premium Point \$450

- Create Annual Large Fundraiser: (possible ideas)
  - Outdoor Concert
  - "Stand Still" Parade/Fair
